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Christmas to Epiphany. . . and Then Where?

A message from District President, Sandie Harjala

By the time you read this you probably have taken down the Christmas tree and put the decorations away. But Christmas doesn't end until Epiphany — which we celebrate on January 6. As a child, and still as an adult, we leave the tree and lights up until at least January 8, my birthday. As a little girl my birthday presents were always put under the Christmas tree.

So what does Epiphany mean? First, the name epiphany comes from the Greek *epiphaneia*, meaning "appearance" or "manifestation." This refers to the celebration of God manifesting as the baby Jesus and revealing Himself to the world. When the Magi found Jesus, he was not in the manger, but was likely closer to being a toddler, living in a house in Bethlehem. Jesus's baptism is also celebrated during Epiphany.

The next important day to stop and think about is Ash Wednesday, which is celebrated on March 5, 2025. Ash Wednesday is the beginning of Lent, the season of the church year which leads up to the crucifixion of Christ. This is a time to repent and look for ways to leave our pet sins behind. Do you give something up for Lent? This year, how about trying to give up an attitude or response that doesn't reflect Jesus? Maybe it's an anger issue or speaking disrespectfully to people who get on your nerves. Many years ago I did just that — gave up disrespectful speech. As a result, people I didn't even know asked me if I found Jesus. It was then that I realized how badly I had been acting. Not long after that I really did open my heart and life to Jesus.

May 2025 be special as you spend more time with Jesus and letting others see you reflecting His love and grace. Have a blessed and Happy New Year!

Behold, I am the servant of the Lord; may it be done to me according to your word (Luke 1:38).



H ave you ever given any thought as to how the mites you contribute to your local group actually make it to where they are used? When you put your mites in a basket or give them to your treasurer they don't just disappear into an endless tunnel.

Your group treasurer faithfully sends those mites to the treasurer for your zone. The zone treasurer collects the mites from all the groups in the zone and reliably sends the money to the financial secretary of the LWML Mid-South District. At the district level the financial secretary makes the deposits and reports them to the board of directors, among others. The district treasurer confirms the deposits reported and sends 25% of the mites collected to the national office of the LWML. That means 75% of the mites you give stay at the district level.

The mites that stay at the district level are used to fund all the grants that were approved at the LWML Mid-South District Convention. At our last district convention, we approved \$130,000 in grants. That means 75 cents of every \$1.00 you

contribute to mites stays in the district and is given to organizations that not only help people with their physical and mental needs, but also share the Gospel with them to strengthen their faith. But that is not all. Remember the 25% that goes on to our national organization of Lutheran Women in Mission? At the national convention in Milwaukee in 2024 \$2.35 million was approved for Mission Grants. Your 25% that you contribute goes to fulfill that commitment for missions around the world.

As your district financial secretary, collector of mites at the district level, I want each member of Lutheran Women in Mission to understand the path your mites travel and to know that the money is safeguarded the entire way to the end use. Your mites are a real and personal way you can serve the work of the Lord.

Our Savior Lutheran Church, Nashville Celebrating with Sisters in Christ

ur Savior Lutheran Church (OSLC) Women in Mission recently prepared and served dinner to the friends, families and residents of Oak Cottage for Women, who gathered to celebrate the graduation of three Oak Cottage residents. Oak Cottage is a faith-based life skills residential program that gives women a safe and loving environment as they prepare to re-enter society following release from the Tennessee State prison system. They have two homes located in Franklin, Tennessee. The residents are provided support and strength physically, emotionally, vocationally and spiritually.

During the six-month program, residents attend mandatory classes five days a week that help with addiction, conflict resolution, budgeting, Bible studies, etc., and help them gain employment. The program's focus is to help these women with everything they need to restart their life.

A program of celebration occurs when a small group of women meet the graduation requirements. OSLC Women in Mission are happy to celebrate along with these women, demonstrating love and support for sisters in Christ.
